





### WTO BE MONEY SMA

Having your own business is hard work! In between schoolwork and housework, we know it can be challenging to find time to pursue your passion. But once you've followed your heart, there's no turning back! Especially when the money starts to roll in. Just make sure you're as smart with your money as you are with your ideas. Follow these guidelines to stay on track to financial freedom!

### Startup costs

Now that you have your Big Idea, how much money do you need to get your business up and running? You might need supplies like ingredients or fabric. Maybe you need equipment to make your product or software to deliver your service. Work out how much each item will cost. The total amount is your startup cost. The next step is to figure out how you're going to fund your business. Perhaps you have money saved up or a family member who would like to invest in your new venture. Don't let a lack of funds get you down. Start with what you have and use the profits to grow your business.

### Cost per unit

To make sure you ask the right price for your product, you need to know how much it costs to produce each item. This is called the cost per unit. List all your expenses. Divide the total amount by the number of products you can make to sell:

total expenses / number of products you can make = cost per unit

### Pricing

Now that you have a good idea of how much your product will cost to produce, you can decide on an appropriate price. Research your competitors. How much are they charging for the same product? Should you charge more or less? Make sure your final pricing is more than the cost per unit.

### Profit

For your business to be successful, you need to make a profit. This means you have to charge more for your product than the cost of producing it. Use the following formula:

selling price - cost price = gross profit

### Budget

Use a budget to plan for future expenses, like new equipment, emergency repairs or product improvements. In the budget, record the

expected income and expenses of your business during a specific period, e.g. December. Create two columns. Under

income, record all the money you anticipate to receive for the selling of your product or service. Under expenditure, write down all your expected expenses, such as telephone costs, ingredients and advertising. Subtract the expenditure from the income. Do you have a surplus (money left over) or a deficit (a negative balance)? If there is no difference, it means you are breaking even not losing money but also not making any.

### Finally

Open a bank account to keep your money safe. Now you can write down your financial goals and make a plan to spend, save and share your money wisely. You work hard for your money. Make sure your money

## BURDEN OF PROOF

DEFINITION

the responsibility to provide proof for something

In a debate, both the proposition and the opposition team have the burden of proof. This means each team has to provide evidence to support any claims made in a motion.

For example, if your team proposes that artificial intelligence is dangerous, you cannot base your argument on a personal fear of robots (although we agree, they can be scary!). Instead, you can prove your claim by referring to a number of credible news sources, like TED Talks or any Elon Musk interview where he talks about AI.

If you don't give a reason for your statement, you can easily end up with a weak argument. For example, by simply saying South Africa should ban alcohol because it is bad. Why is it bad? Who is it bad for? What is the meaning of 'bad' in this context? You will have a much stronger argument if you say alcohol should be banned because it damages the user's health.





In creative writing, irony can be used to create an amusing situation that illicits an emotional response from the reader. This is a great way to add an authentic layer to your story, since our real-life experiences are often the opposite of our expectations.

The best way to practise this writing technique is to look for every-day situations around you in which your ordinary expectations are contradicted, like when a friend posts a selfie on Instagram to complain about how much she hates selfies.

## WITH CHIMPS

Did you know that chimpanzees, along with bonobos, could be our cousins? They have more in common with humans than with gorillas! Chimps are classified as great apes, not monkeys. How do you tell the difference? Unlike monkeys, apes do not have a tail. Gorillas and orangutans are also part of the ape family.

A great deal of our knowledge about chimpanzees comes from the groundbreaking work conducted by Dr Jane Goodall. She is a primatologist, a person who studies primates. For many years, she lived amongst the chimpanzees in Tanzania, observing and imitating their behaviour.


She discovered that, just like humans, chimps have emotions, use tools and enjoy a diet of fruit, plants and meat, which makes them omnivores. While they show love and affection through hugging, kissing and caring for each other, they can also be violent and aggressive.

> There are between 172 700 and 299 700 chimpanzees left on earth, which puts them on the list of endangered species. The threats to their survival include hunting, disease and the destruction of their habitat (forests).

### CHIMP STATS

- We share 98% of our DNA with chimpanzees.
- Chimps are social beings that live in large groups of up to 120 apes.
- Just like us, chimpanzees experience a wide range of emotions like joy, anger, grief, sorrow and depression.
- While they often live near water, these great apes cannot swim.
- They are native to the African continent.
- People like to adopt chimpanzees as exotic pets, but this is a bad idea. A large male chimp can weigh up to 90 kilograms and stand 1.7 metres tall. They also tend to become more aggressive with age.

Bridges are marvels of engineering. Spanning over long distances and short ones, these human-made structures are designed to carry people, cars, large trucks and trains across mountains and over water. They have to withstand the forces of nature.

Bridge engineers, also known as civil engineers, have to ensure that these structures are safe for us to use. This experiment will help you understand the physics of bridges and which shapes create structures strong enough to support these heavy loads.

### **YOU WILL NEED**

- Wooden lolly sticks
- Toothpicks
- Spaghetti
- Glue
- Items of equal weight to test the strength of the bridge (cans of baked beans, wooden blocks, text books, etc.)
- Notebook

### INSTRUCTIONS

- 1. In your notebook, draw a picture of the bridge you want to build.
- 2. Build three versions of your bridge design, each time using one of the materials from the list above.
- 3. Take note of the following: how much material you use for each bridge, any challenges you came across and which bridge you think will work best.
- 4. Make sure all three bridges span the same distance.
- 5. Use two chairs to suspend your bridge.
- 6. Now add the weights one by one to test the strength of each bridge. Add weights until the bridges break.
- In your notebook, write down how much weight each bridge could hold.

Was your hypotheses correct? Give an explanation for your answer.

# BUSHFIRES:

Australia is no stranger to bushfires. Every year the country down under has to fight flames at some point during their dry, hot summer. But their most recent spate of bushfires raged for weeks on end, damaging more than 11 million hectares of bush, forest and parks. People lost their lives and many animals too. Even in South Africa, bushfires are as common as the Christmas beetle in December.

### WHAT IS A BUSHFIRE?

A bushfire is a type of wildfire that burns through wild vegetation, usually when the weather is hot and dry. Spurred on by strong winds, these fires can spread at a rapid pace of 10.8 kilometres per hour

in forests and 22 kilometres per hour in grasslands. Since bushfires can smoulder for days, they are unpredictable and difficult to control.

### WHAT CAUSES BUSHFIRES?

A bushfire can start naturally, for example when lightning strikes dry

vegetation, or it can be caused by humans, either accidentally or on purpose. Although we can't blame climate change for bushfires, the warming planet does play a role in making them more destructive. A severe drought creates the perfect breeding ground for a spark.

### ARE BUSHFIRES ALL BAD?

Surprisingly not! Low-intensity fires can save trees from disease and harmful insects. In the Western Cape, our fynbos thrives after a fire. This is because the high temperatures help to germinate new seeds stored in the soil. Farmers and people who take care of nature reserves often use controlled fires to clear dry vegetation to prevent massive bushfires that can't be controlled.

## MAKE SPRINKLES DANCE

This experiment is all about good vibrations! See how you can make sprinkles move by using only sound.

### YOU WILL NEED

- Bluetooth speaker
- Cell phone
- 6 x wooden lolly sticks
- Tape
- Clear plastic wrap
- Rubber band
- Sprinkles

### INSTRUCTIONS

- 1. Tape all 6 lolly sticks around the outside of the speaker facing up. Make sure the bottom ends of the sticks are level with the speaker and the top ends stick out above the speaker.
- 2. Cover the speaker and sticks in plastic wrap. Make sure the wrap stretches tightly over the top of the sticks.
- 3. Secure the wrap with a rubber band.
- 4. Place the sprinkles onto the plastic wrap and switch on the music.

### RESULTS

The sprinkles should be bouncing up and down to the sound of the music.

As the sound waves move, the air particles vibrate, which causes the sprinkles to move.
